

Year 9 and 10 students have made remarkable progress on the school pond project.



This practical experience has proven invaluable in contextualising school operations while simultaneously equipping students with hands-on skills that complement their career aspirations.



Did you know that an extraordinary teacher's passion for adventure has created life-changing opportunities for young people across the UK?

Reg Gilbert MBE, who taught Maths and PE at Frome Grammar School (later Frome College), was a man of remarkable spirit. From roller-skating 7 miles to school as a boy to save his tram fare, to training as an RAF pilot during WWII, and later pioneering student expeditions to Iceland, the Sahara, Ghana and Papua New Guinea—Reg believed in pushing boundaries.



Reg's conviction that "students should spend time living with indigenous people to experience their culture and way of life" led him to establish GIFT Friendship Trust upon his retirement. Today, this charity continues his vision by providing financial support to young people undertaking volunteering projects with homestays in developing countries. Young people like Jaele, who recently returned from



Honduras, where she experienced profound cultural exchange: "I have come back as a new person... with so many new perspectives of the world and a mind more open than ever!"



Year 12 students embarked on an exciting educational trip to the Diamond Light Source, the UK's national synchrotron facility, located at the Discovery Centre (DISCOT). This visit offered our students an incredible opportunity to learn about cutting-edge scientific research and the role of synchrotron radiation in advancing modern science.



Frome Skatepark Project, a community group raising funds for a new skatepark in Frome, is excited to announce a Family Fun Day and Skate Jam on Saturday 10th May from 10am to 4pm at the skate park in the Mary Baily field, adjacent to Victoria Park. The event is a follow up to a highly successful event held by the group last September, with the addition of free skate lessons for young people aged 8 to 18 between 10am and 12pm (booking essential). The Skate Jam follows the skate lessons and will run between 1pm and 4pm. Activities to keep younger children amused will be available alongside the skate jam event.

This vibrant community event, organised in conjunction with Frome Town Council, is also an opportunity for people to share thoughts and ideas for the future of the skatepark and a potential new location within the Mary Baily field.

The event promises a day of excitement and fun for the entire family, with best trick competitions and music creating an energetic atmosphere. All wheeled sports enthusiasts, including skateboarders, roller skaters, scooter riders, and BMX bikers, are welcome to join in the activities. 
