
Year 12 Raising Achievement Evening Thursday 13th July

Post Sixth Form Options

University

- Apply through UCAS (Universities and Colleges Admissions Service), all of Year 12 should have registered on Destinations Day
- Your son/daughter should have already filled out the UCAS form and linked their account to Frome College
- They now need to research the courses they wish to apply for, they get 5
 choices
- Your son/daughter will also need to write a personal statement to support their application. They've had a session on this on Destinations Day and they have the resources on FROG



University – Choosing a course

- There are over 50,000 to choose from
- Factors to consider:
- Subject academic or vocational?
- Course detail
- Entry criteria
- Location
- Campus/City universities
- Reputation
- Career plans

University – choosing a course

Your son/daughter has 5 choices of courses on UCAS

• We recommend:

- 2 aspirational choices (above their final predictions)
- 2 on/around their final predications
- 1 backup (lower than their final predictions)

Applying through UCAS – the process

- 1. Register on UCAS (should already be completed)
- 2. Fill out UCAS form (should have started this)
- 3. Choose 5 courses (research should be underway, continue over the Summer)
- 4. Draft personal statement (should have started). Get feedback from personal tutor/subject teachers, make changes. Upload to UCAS when ready
- 5. Complete purple form get everything signed off. Hand to personal tutor
- 6. The application will be checked then sent to UCAS (by December 1st)
- 7. Universities will reply conditional offer, unconditional offer, rejection
- 8. When all have replied your son/daughter will need to narrow their offers down to 2 a firm and an insurance (lower grade offer). This needs to be done by early June
- 9. A level results in August

University - Offers

- Conditional offer your son/daughter will have a place if they achieve certain grades/UCAS points.
- Contextual offers and EPQ/Core Maths

- Unconditional offer your son/daughter has a place on the course irrespective of the grades they achieve
- Rejection your son/daughter's application to this course was unsuccessful

University – Early Applicants

 Medicine, Veterinary Science, Dentistry and Oxbridge must complete their application by the 3rd week of September

Entrance exams

Seek support from Dr Arnold and subject teachers

• Deadline for everyone else is **December 1st**

University – Personal statements

- Started work on this during Destinations Day, should continue with this over the Summer
- Your son/daughter's chance to explain why they should be given an offer for the course they've applied for
- You only get 1 personal statement courses applied for must therefore be the same/very similar
- Students have been given a planning sheet and watched a pre-recorded session on this during Destinations Day. They will need to do several drafts this takes time
- Support available from personal tutor, subject teachers and a planning sheet and pre-recorded session sent out on FROG
- Video <u>clip</u> personal statements

What is a degree level apprenticeship?

- Gain a full undergraduate or master's degree while you work.
- Take three to six years to complete, depending on the course level.
- Spend most of your time working and you'll also study part-time at university.
- Spend about 20% of your time studying vs. 80% of your time working. Blocks or a couple of days a week.

Pros and cons of a degree apprenticeship

- Pros of a degree apprenticeship
- You'll get <u>real-life experience</u> working alongside your degree.
- Your degree is <u>fully paid for</u>, so there's no cost to you.
- You'll get paid a <u>salary</u> just like a normal employee
- Cons of a degree apprenticeship
- You'll need to <u>balance working and studying</u> at the same time.
- You won't qualify for any <u>student loans</u>.
- Apprentices don't always get the traditional 'university experience'.



How do I find a degree level apprenticeship?

- You apply the same way you apply for a normal job.
- Submit an application, which usually includes a CV and cover letter.
- Advertised throughout the year and there is no application cycle like there is with university.
- The vacancy will state when the application deadline is, and when the apprenticeship is due to start.
